## The Webb Family

This story began back in Jackson County which is located in the Northern part of Middle Tennessee. In the early part of the 18th Century the landscape was very rugged in the village of Haydenburg and sourrounding communities. With thick forest, narrow roads, high hills, deep valley's, creeks and the roaring river it was a beautiful place to live. It was not very far away from the foot hills of the Cumberland Mountains. The county seat of Gainesboro and the community of North Springs.

The Presbyterian, Baptist, and Christian churches, the school house, the country store, the blacksmith shops, where the mules and horses were shod along with farm tools worked on, such as plow points, hoes, hand saws, were sharpened, and saw mills where lumber was made for building materials. The gristmills to grind corn for bread were a very busy place. This was a farming community.

The church services, Revival Meetings, community singings were times of spiritual worship and fellowship.

Some names of the people that lived there were the Webbs, Smiths, Clark, Haffines, Terrys, Hix, and Bevins.

George Washington Webb was born March 9, 1848, in Jackson County, Tennessee. He died November 2, 1935, in Macon County, Tennessee. He was buried in Haydenburg Cemetary in Jackson County, Tennessee.




Later he decided to go to Medical School, for he said he felt like a minister of the gospel should be a medical doctor as well. That way they could minister to the souls and bodies of the people. So they moved to Nashville, Tennessee, for his medical training. After he completed his training they moved back to Jackson County at Haydenburg, where he preached the Gospel and practiced medicene.

They had nine (9) children; James, Burton, Marietta (Mary), Laura, Bedford, Noah, Mattie, Lee, and Harley. With meals to cook, laundary to do, cows to milk, chickens, hogs, horses to feed, plowing, hoeing, working in the fields, vegetable garden fruit and vegetables to be canned. Hogs to be butchered, going to school, church services, revival meetings, community singings and the weddings, this must have been a very busy place.

G.W. Webbs children. From left to right I think they are as follows: James, Lee, Mary, Harley, Bedford, Noah, Mattie Webb.


In 1904, Dr. G. W. Webb and wife and sons, Bedford and Harley moved to Lafayette, the county seat of Macon County, Tennessee. Dr. G. W. Webb and sons owned a Saw Mill, Planeing Mill, and Gristmill. With this macheniery, they opened a construction company four (4) miles east of Lafayette, Tennessee.

### The Webb Mills

They bought up boundaries of timber, hired men to cut the trees and haul the logs to the mill, where they were cut and made into lumber for building material.

The carpenters built houses and barns in the community and the surrounding communities.

With new people moving in, soon the community grew to be a nice size village. It was then called Webb Town and is that name today. It was a very nice place to live. Some of the families that lived there were the Jenkins, Hargis, Andrews, Kirbys, Gregory, Brays, and others.



As you will see there is a lot of mixed up kinfolks.

One night Mr. & Mrs. Eason Hargis had a social singing at their house. This is where this story begins. The Webb and Jenkins families who lived in Webb Town were among the group there.

The tall handsome Webbs', Bedford and Harley, met the pretty blonde Mary Frances (Mollie) Jenkins and her sister, Elena, a pretty brunette. In a short time, Bedford and Mary Frances (Mollie), were married in 1905.



At their wedding, Harley was dating Elena, so very soon another wedding ceremony was to be preformed. Harley Webb and Elena Jenkins were married. Please note that this is brothers married to sisters. This will make their children all double cousins from the start.

As you have noticed that from the beginning with Dr.~G.~W.~Webb and his brother, Houston, married sisters. Dr.~G.~W.~Webbs' children did the same thing. Brothers married sisters.

By this time James and Eliza Webb with their children, Burton, Amanda, Martin, Corlin, and Claude, moved to Webb Town.

Dr. G. W. Webb's son, Noah, was an ordained minister of the Gospel in the Presbyterian Church. He was a curcit rider preacher. He preached in Tennessee, Arkansas, and New Mexico. He moved to New Mexico and there Noah met a pretty girl by the name of Cora Lovette and they were married. They had four (4) children. One (1) son, John, and three (3) daughters, Olete, Ocie and Marrietta.

Dr. Webb and wife moved from Lafayette to Webb Town where he was the only Medical Doctor there and was kept very busy.

Dr. Webb's daughter, Mary Green, that lived in Oklahoma, moved back to Webb Town, after her husbands death, with her five (5) children to live. Johnie, Winnie, Floyd, Fountain, and Hommer Green were her childrens' names.

James and Eliza Webb had a new baby daughter, Etta, in Macon, Co.

Bedford and Mary Frances (Mollie) had their first baby daughter, Ruby Delno. Then later their sons, Clayton, Earl, Vestel, and B.C., Jr., and another daughter, Gladys, were born.

Harley and Elena's first baby, a son named Cordell and later a daughter, Mazelle, were borned in Webb Town, Macon County. Two (2) sons Mitchell, Wiseman, and two (2) daughters, Geneva and Virginia were born in Jackson County.

Laura and Lon Cassetty lived in Jackson County and they had two (2) children, a daughter, Ethel and a son, Comer.

Burton and Lucy Webb lived in Nashville. They had three (3) boys, Oscar, Benton, and Wallace.

Lee and Vallie Webb lived in Odessa, Texas. They had seven (7) children. Henry, Herman, Herschell, Melvin, Lee Jr., Oleta and Naomi.

Mattie and John Cassetty lived in Jackson County, Tennessee. They had six (6) children. Clio, Maude, Chester, Elva, Johnie, and Charles.

That made Dr. Webb and wife a big family of children and Grand-children. Some of the Great and Great-Great-Grandchildren's names will be listed. Dr. G. W. Webb's wife, Winnie Jane, Died May 24, 1908. She was buried in the Haydenburg Cemetry in Jackson County, Tennessee.

James Webb's wife, Eliza died August, 1908. She was buried in the Krantz Cemetry near Webb Town, Tennessee.

Mary Webb Green met John Wiseman Jenkins and they were married in Macon County. They had two (2) sons, Hugh and Houston Jenkins.

James Webb and Laura Andrews were married. Then the family moved to Nashville. They had one (1) daughter, Amy.

Dr. G. W. Webb and Amanda Wheeler were married. They lived in Webb town for several years. Then moved to Red Boiling Springs. Amanda died in 1929. She was buried in the Big Branch Cemetry in Jackson County, Tennessee.
