Webbs in History:

William Henry Webb

William Henry Webb, by many called "America's first naval architect," was born June 19, 1816 in New York City. His ancestors were among the first settlers of the New Haven Colony. Isaac Webb, his father, was born in Stamford, Connecticut in 1794, and had moved to New York City with his father, Wilsey Webb. Wilsey had been employed as a carpenter in the shipyards, and at the young age of 16, Isaac Webb had convinced his father's employer, the noted shipbuilder, Henry Eckford, to allow him to apprentice under him. This set the stage for Isaac Webb to become one of the premier shipbuilders of his time.

William Henry Webb grew up on the docks, surrounded by his father's trade. He knew early

on that he wanted to follow his father into the shipbuilding business and even made his first boat when he was just 12 years old. But William did not have a strong constitution, and his parents were concerned for his health, so they discouraged him, preferring that he choose a profession that did not

require long hours in a cold shipyard. William's desires prevailed, and while he was on a trip to Scotland to learn Europe's shipbuilding practices, his father Isaac died unexpectedly. This was the year 1840, and William was just twenty-three when he took the helm of his father's business, "Webb & Allen." He began to go through his father's accounts, working tirelessly to put his father's business into a more secure financial footing. Later, when people asked William what his secret of success was, he would reply "attention to detail." But others would count his natural abilities as a mathematician and his ability to combine this with the "Art" of shipbuilding that made him a master of his trade.

In the initial years of his taking over the business, he mostly produced ferries, sloops and schooners. In 1843, he bought out his father's partner, John Allen, and renamed the business "William H. Webb." By 1849 the business had reached a great level of success and was in the forefront of cutting edge ship design. The Gold Rush had brought with it an increased demand for new ships to take supplies and men to the West. Speed in ships became of utmost importance and his clipper ship "Comet" was produced during this time period. It was in 1853 that the Comet beat the famous clipper ship the "Flying Dutchman" in a race around the Horn to San Francisco. The Comet ranged between 103 to 128 days from NY to SF, depending on conditions. William H. Webb's steamship "California" was the first to enter the Golden Gate and it was his company that built the first steamers for the Pacific Mail Steamship Co. William H. Webb was known to have built 133 vessels between 1840 and 1865. Eventually he was to design and build the world's longest ironclad wooden-hulled ship, the USS Dunderberg.

When the Civil War came to a close, the ship building business experienced a huge drop in orders. The government had sold most of its ships at extremely low prices and this depressed the ship building business and brought the New York shipbuilding business to near ruin. He also was well aware that the shipbuilding trade was moving more and more toward ships built from iron rather than wood. William H. Webb, being the savvy businessman he was, closed his business in 1869.

His huge success had created a fortune and gave him the luxury of putting his energy into philanthropic pursuits. One of these was The Webb Academy and Home for Shipbuilders, now known as "Webb Institute", where he gave young men who showed high promise, but who were without financial means, the opportunity to learn the art of shipbuilding. He also was a member of the Anti-corruption council and is given credit for obtaining a safe water delivery system for New York that is still used today. Three times he was asked to become Mayor of New York, which he turned down all three times.

William H. Webb married Henrietta Amelia Hidden and they had two children, William E. Webb and Marshall Webb. Like his father, he died suddenly at his home on 5th Ave in New York City, on Oct 30, 1899.

Osprey, Manatee Co., Florida

In 1867 Judge John G. Webb moved from Utica, New York to Florida and was the first white man to settle in the area that he would later name Osprey after the birds that made their home there. In 1872, Judge Webb began to offer accommodations for visitors to the area and he established The Webb Hotel. It was the first winter resort in Manatee Co.

Judge John G. Webb's cousin was Silas A. Webb of Oswego, New York.

History of Lake Co.

"Chase Edgar Webb, Waukegan, III., Retired. Born in Ithaca, N. Y., March 26, 1843, son of Thomas P. and Margaret [Fink] Webb; came to Antioch Township in 1844: August, 1862, enlisted in Company C, Ninety-sixth Illinois Volunteer infantry and served until the close of the war; from February, 1866, to 1886, engaged in farming in Warren, Antioch and Avon Townships: supervisor [Republican candidate] from Avon Township, 1881-83; elected Sheriff, Lake County, 1886: Chief of Police of Waukegan, 1891-97; engaged in coal, wood and ice business, Waukegan, 1891-1901 Knight Templar in Masonry; married October 14, 1865, to Jeannette S. Minto, who died February 18, 1890; children are <u>Nelle J.</u>, wife of Robert S. Smart, Elgin, Ill.; <u>David T.</u>; <u>Frank A.</u>; <u>Maggie M.</u> wife of Lewis Yager, Waukegan; <u>Edward C.</u>, Waukegan; married to Mrs. Nancy Taylor, December 2, 1897."

"David Thomas Webb, Waukegan, III., Secretary of the Waukegan, Fox Lake & Western Electric Railway Company. Born in Warren Township, July 18, 1868, son of Chase E. and Jeannette [Minto] Webb; at the age of twenty-one years he was made Deputy Sheriff under his father, serving until December, 1890, when he engaged with this father in the coal and ice business, continuing until August 1900; served as Deputy under Sheriff George Brown, four years; member of the Republican county central committee, F. & A. M. and M. W. A.; an incorporator of the E., F. L. & W. R. R., of which he has since been Secretary; married May 21, 1891, to Ida Miltimore; they have a daughter, Lucile."

"Ira R. Webb, Retired Farmer, Antioch Township. Born in Warren, Herkimer County. New York, June 2, 1823. He was educated in the public schools of Herkimer County, and removed to Antioch Township in 1845, where he engaged in farming. Politicaly Mr. Webb is a Republican, and has been identified with the party for a great many years; has served as School Trustee for thirty years. Township Treasurer four years, and Collector three terms. In 1844 he was married to Miss Jane Potter of Warren, New York."

Historical Encyclopedia of Illinois, 1903

White Co., Illinois

"Webb, Edwin B., early lawyer and politician, was born about 1802, came to the vicinity of Carmi, White County, III, about 1828 to 1830, and, still later, studied law at Transylvania University. He held the office of Prosecuting Attorney of White County, and in 1834, was elected to the lower branch of the General Assembly, serving, by successive reelections, until 1842, and in the senate, from 1842 to '46. During his service in the House he was a colleague and political and personal friend of Abraham Lincoln. He opposed the internal improvement scheme of 1837, predicting many of the disasters which were actually realized a few years later. H was a candidate for Presidential Elector on the Whig ticket, in 1844 and '48, and, in 1852, received the nomination for Governor as the opponent of Joel A. Matteson, two years later, being an unsuccessful candidate for Justice of the Supreme Court in opposition to Judge W. B. Scates. While practicing law at Carmi, he was also a partner of his brother in the mercantile business. Died, Oct. 14, 1858, in the 56th year of his age."

Town of America, Illinois

"Webb, Henry Livingston, soldier and pioneer [an elder brother of James Watson Webb, a noted New York journalist], was born at Claverack, N. Y., Feb. 6, 1795; served as a soldier in the War of 1812, came to Southern Illinois in 1817, and became one of the founders of the town of America near the mouth of the Ohio; was Representative in the fourth and Eleventh General Assemblies, a Major in the Black Hawk War and Captain of volunteers and, afterwards, Colonel of regulars, in the Mexican War. In 1860 he went to Texas and served, for a time, in a semi-military capacity under the Confederate Government; returned to Illinois in 1869, and died, at Makanda, Oct. 5, 1876."

His paternal grandparents were Thomas P. and Margaret [Fink] Webb, who came from the vicinity of Ithaca, New York, to Lake County, Illinois, in 1846, settling near Gages Lake in Antioch Township. He took up land from the Government, and five of his brothers likewise took up land in the same vicinity. Theses brothers were George, Albert, Charles, Christopher and Ira.....Thomas Webb was a millwright by trade..... [Thomas Webb's] son, Chase Webb, was born in New York State in 1843 and was three years old when brought to Illinois....Chase E. Webb died in August, 1916. His wife was Jeanette Minto who was born at Loon Lake in Antioch Township, Lake County in 1845.....She was a daughter of David and Jane [Johnson] Minto, both of whom were natives of Scotland.

Mr. [David T.] Webb married at Waukegan, May 21, 1891, Miss Ida Miltimore, of Waukegan...Her people were likewise early settlers of Lake County. Her parents, James H. and Caroline [Peck] Miltimore, were born in New York State and were children when the Miltimore and Peck families came to Illinois and settled at Miltimore Lake in Lake County. Mr. and Mrs. Webb had three children, two dying in infancy. Their daughter, Lucille J., graduated from the Waukegan High School in 1912...."

Mr. and Mrs Webb have three children: Estella, born February 27, 1895,...Normalee, born in September, 1897.... and Donald, born September 13, 1900...."

Biographical Memoirs of Hancock County, Indiana, 1902

James F. Webb -

"...James F. Webb is a native son of the Hoosier state, having been born in Franklin county, February 7, 1856. His parents were Jacob H. and Lydia [Price] Webb, the former of Preble county, Ohio, and the latter of Maryland. The paternal grandfather was Tyner Webb, also a native of Ohio. Jacob H. Webb was reared in the Buckeye state, was a shoemaker by trade and also followed farming to some extent. He moved to Franklin county, Indiana in 1836 where he worked at his trade and also owned town property. He came to Maxwell, Hancock county, in 1880 and his death occurred there in 1888. His wife died some ten years later. Both were members of the Methodist church. Their children, six in number, were s follows: Minerva became the wife of John Baker; Lyman is deceased; Oscar is a farmer and cattle raiser at Protection, Kansas; James F. is the subject; Emmons lives in Maxwell and Edgar at Indianapolis.

James F. Webb lived at home until his eleventh year and afterward worked at different occupations. In 1870 he came to Buck Creek township, Hancock county, and there followed farming ...

Mr. Webb has been twice married. His first wife was Miss Cassie Merchant, of Center township, this county, the daughter of John P. and Melinda Merchant. They had one child, a son, Oscar, a farmer of near Endon. Mrs. Webb died May 6, 1877 and for his second wife Mr. Webb chose Miss Julia A. Shipley, their marriage being consummated February 7, 1878. She is a native of Center township and the daughter of Thomas and Sarah [Pratt] Shipley, early pioneers of Hancock county, coming from Preble county, Ohio. The children of this second union were as follows: Charlie is at home; Rosa became the wife of B. Whitworth, of Henry county, Indiana, and they have one daughter, Nora; Willie, Albert, Ethel, Lydia and Nellie, at home....."

Chadwick's History of Shelby County, Indiana

Edward H. Chadwick, 1909

"Dr. Albert G. Webb, who was a son-in-law of Major John Hendricks, began to practice of medicine in Shelbyville, along about 1840. He was well educated and a successful physician. He was active yet a young man his useful career was cut short by his death from cholera, in 1850. The death of such a popular physician from that dreaded disease was so much of a shock to the then little city of Shelbyville that on the following day many of the inhabitants left the city to remain away until the danger was passed."

James Davis Webb -

"The founder of the family of this name in Shelby county was a Pennsylvanian, domesticated awhile in Kentucky, but with the restlessness of the time he migrated again to Indiana and located in Shelby county on the on the old Ephriam Tucker farm on Sugar creek, near Second Mount Pleasant church. But the migratory spirit still stirred within him and his next move was to Ozark, Missouri. There he was stricken with a fatal sickness and three of his sons walked to Ozark in the dead of winter, riding horseback the last day to be present at his bedside. The old pioneer ordered them to bury him in the mountains, and after the melancholy duty had been performed they started back to Indiana in a wagon draw by oxen, bringing their mother with them. Al this occurred in about 1835 and the mother, after residing with her children for twelve years, closed her earthly career in 1855. John G. Webb, one of her sons, married Manda Clark and later moved to Franklin, Indiana where he went into the dry goods business, but later became a blacksmith and still later ran a grist mill at Columbus. He died at Indianapolis in April, 1888, having survived his wife forty years. her death occurring in 1848.

James D. Webb, son of John G., was born in Hendricks township, Shelby county, Indiana, October 22, 1843..... On July 16, 1866, he married Sarah F., daughter of Ephriam and Susan [Davidson] Tucker, well known for many years as progressive farmers of Shelby county. Though they have no children of their own, Mr. and Mrs. Webb have two New York orphans and two half-brothers, all of whom are grown up, entered business and are doing well...."

Louis E. Webb -

"The printing fraternity has no finer representative or more competent workman than Louis E. Webb, who has mastered his trade by going through every step from office boy to sole proprietor.... He is a son of Robert L. and Caroline [Mason] Webb, well known citizens of Shelbyville for many years natives of Fayette county. Robert L. was pushed out on the world in boyhood and compelled to weed his own row with little help from others. He was in the livery and hotel business at various points, met with the usual successes and reverses of those hazardous callings and died in 1905 at Terre Haute, where he had lived for some years. His wife preceded him to the grave, having died in 1904. They have five children, Mollie, the eldest daughter, married Charles A. Ross,....Catherine,... married John Edward Beggs....Stella L. ... Ross, the fourth child, died in infancy.

Louis E. Webb, the surviving son, was born in Brownsville, Indiana, November 11, 1866.... Eventually he went to Detroit and spent three years as a printer... February 11, 1891, Mr. Webb married Elizabeth, daughter of Richard D. and Teresa A. Flaitz... Mr. and Mrs. Webb had only one child who died in infancy.

Iowa

A Biographical Record of Boone County, Iowa John M. Brainard, 1902

Jason E. Webb -

"Jason E. Webb, who is now enjoying a well earned rest from labor, making his home with his son Q. O. Webb, is a native of Ohio, his birth having occurred in Mahoning county October 9, 1824. His father, James Webb, was a native of Maryland, born near Baltimore and there he was reared, removing to Ohio when a young man. He became one of the first settlers of Mahoning county and in the midst of the forest he hewed out a home... He married Keziah Bowman, who was born in Redstone, Pennsylvania... he reared his family and lived to an advanced age, passing away in July, 1863, when he had attained the ripe old age of eighty-four years. He served his country as a soldier in the war of 1812 and was ever a loyal citizen.

Jason E. Webb.... spent his boyhood days.... Farming in Mahoning county, Ohio, for a number of years.... he enlisted on the 31st of October, 1861, as a member of Company K, Fifth Ohio Calvary.... He went to the west,

spending some time in Montana, Kansas and Nebraska, where he followed various pursuits, engaging in any kind of labor that would yield to him an honest living. Prior to the war Mr. Webb had married. In Mahoning ocounty, Ohio, in 1844, he was joined in wedlock to Miss Rebecca Cook, and unto them were born seven children, three of whom are living: Q. O....Louisa, the wife of Owen Elliott....Ellen, the wife of J. S. Elliott.... The mother of these children died in 1865, and, as before stated, Mr. Webb then went to the west. In 1869 he and his son, Q. O. Webb came to lowa, settling in Boone county. Here he first purchased eighty acres of land which was yet in it s primitive condition...

He married Miss Mace, a daughter of Jacob Mace, one of Iowa's early settlers, who came to this state from West Virginia, in 1856. Four children have been born of this union: Ada, the wife of Manning McGregor, ... Bertha, the wife of Albert Howe... Blanch and Mabel, who are yet under the parental roof."

W. L. Kershaw, 1909

Washington Township - Early Settlements

"The first settlement was made in 1856 by B.C. Freeman, of Missouri, J. B. Van Sandt, of Philadelphia, and Alexander Van Sandt. Shortly afterward came Messrs. Mawhinney, J. S. Johnson, the Webb family, Charles Wilkinson, Mullen and a few others who "staked out" claims and at once began to build homes for themselves."

...Mr. Webb was married December 4, 1889 to Barbara A. Carter, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James M. Carter. Mr. and Mrs. Webb have one daughter, Mary Jeanette who is still with her parents..."

History of Story County, Iowa

W. O. Payne, 1911

Words of A. K. Webb, of Wagner, Oklahoma in June of 1910:

"My parents, Mr. and Mrs. Nathan Webb, came from the state of Indiana to Iowa in the spring of 1848 and settled at Trullinger's Grove in Polk county, three miles north of where Mitchellville is now located...In the spring of 1852, we moved from Polk County to Story County and settled on the old home farm near Iowa Center, a town which was subsequently surveyed and platted by Jeremiah Cory, Jr., in 1853 or 4...."

Miss Mary Ellen Webb -

"...In 1865 [James W. Dunahoo] was united in marriage to Miss Mary Ellen Webb. Her parents were Virginians by birth but came to Iowa from Indiana, settling first in Polk county, where they lived for two years, and then locating in

Story county. Two children were born of their marriage: Elmer Clayton, who is a farmer of Indian Creek township, and Major R., who is also a farmer an lives on the old Dunahoo homestead, which he now owns. The family circle was broken when Mrs. Dunahoo passed way in 1901.

"Eli Webb is a native of Franklin county, Illinois. From November, 1861, until February, 1864, he served in company D, 60th Illinois infantry; re-enlisted in the same, was promoted to first Lieutenant, and August 9, 1865, was honorably discharged. In 1874 he came to Gales, Minnesota, and now owns 240 acres. Mr. Webb is town clerk, and in 1880 was census enumerator. He was united in marriage with L. A. Payne in 1866; she died April 11, 1874. Wilson is her only living child. Sarah Gwin became his wife November 2, 1878, and has one child: Henry."

Lac Qui Parle County

"The next settlers were David P. Lister, E. B. Andrews, John Nash, Sr., David Webb, S. J. Ferguson and Frank Stay, who located in the towns of Cerro Gerdo, Camp Release and Lac qui Parle.....

Cerro Gordo, when first set apart by the Redwood county commissioners in 1871 included what is now Lac qui Parle....The first settler in the town was D. "In Salt Lake Temple, on the 24th of March, 1897, Mr. Southwick was married to Miss Rachel Ann Webb, a daughter of John Stokes and Hannah [Grace] Webb. Her parents were married in England a short time before sailing on the ship Mansfield for America. The vessel weighed anchor on the 8th of April, 1854. At Salt Lake her father worked for Brigham Young for a year and in the fall of 1855 arrived in Lehi, where he became a successful farmer."

Thomas and George Webb of Lehi, Utah

"No history of Lehi would be complete without mention of Thomas Webb....vice president and half owner of the Peoples Bank...Mr. Webb was born in Studham, England, April 20, 1858, a son of George and Sarah [Thorne] Webb. His father was also a native of Studham, Bedfordshire, England, born May 6, 1839, and was a son of William and Emma [Stokes] Webb.... In 1861 he was converted to the Mormon church and for three years prior to coming to America he labored in the Norwich conference of England. On the 3d of June, 1864, in company with his father's family, he left his native country and sailed on the ship Hudson across the Atlantic to the United States. Traveling westward, he journeyed with ox team across the plains and while en route to Salt Lake City his wife died. For a few days George Webb remained in the capital city and then continued his journey to Lehi where he became a most prominent and influential resident..... In 1883 Mr. [Thomas] Webb was united in marriage to Miss Mary Evans, a daughter of Abel Evans, a pioneer of Lehi, who came to Utah from South Wales in 1852....To Mr. and Mrs Webb were born three children: George....Effie May, the wife of Raymond Roberts....Dora, the wife of Val Zimmerman.
